Organizational Overview:

- CURE is the **largest provider of pediatric surgical care** in the developing world. Its hospitals and programs specialize in treating children with **correctable conditions** such as clubfoot, cleft lip and palate, hydrocephalus, and other physical deformities.
- CURE was founded by **Dr. Scott and Sally Harrison** in **1996** as a result of the **intense need for medical and spiritual care** they witnessed in their travels to developing nations.
- As a Christian organization, CURE incorporates **prayer and counseling** into every aspect of its care in a culturally relevant manner.
- CURE hospitals and programs **will not turn away a patient due to an inability to pay, ethnic background or religious affiliation.**

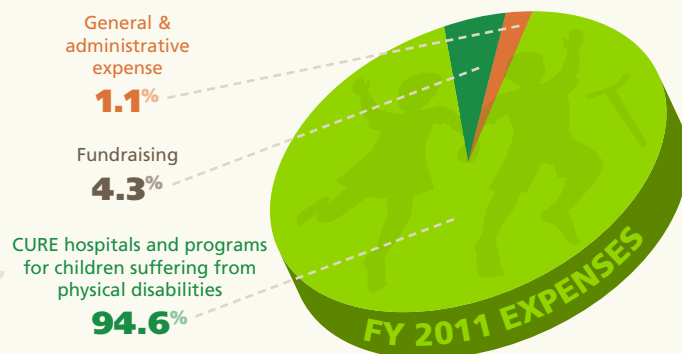

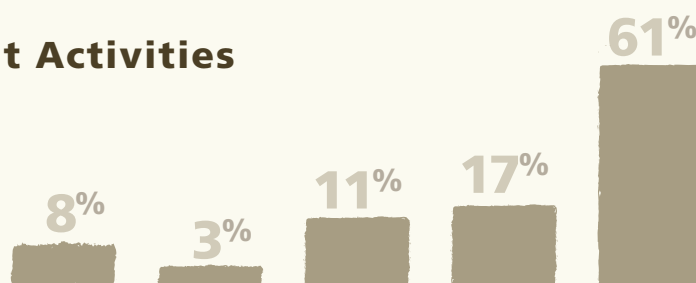

In FY 2011, CURE's development team raised **\$9.097 million** for operational costs, enabling us to deliver over **\$51.359 million** worth of physical and spiritual healing. **Every \$1** of donor contribution to CURE **delivers** a total of **\$5.65 of medical care and spiritual ministry** to those needing it most.

CURE Philippines

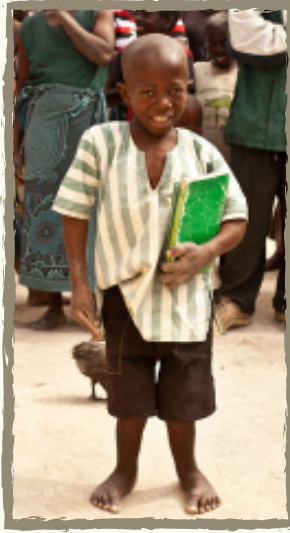

The Tebow-CURE Hospital in Davao City will be a 30-bed surgical facility focusing primarily on orthopedics, with construction beginning in 2012. The hospital will house a Timmy's Playroom, which will provide faith, hope and love to children before and after their surgeries, representing the Foundation's first international playroom.

Mussa Malawi

Meet Mussa Umali. As an infant, Mussa was diagnosed with osteogenesis imperfecta or brittle bone disease, an exceptionally painful condition that leads to ongoing bone fractures and deformities. This led to the boy's legs being severely twisted and malformed in his early years.

Due to Mussa's condition, his mother was abandoned by her husband, ostracized from her community, and had to move back to her home village. There, Mussa's uncle moved in and carried Mussa on his back to help him get around.

During 2011, Mussa's situation improved dramatically when he received a series of leg surgeries at CURE Malawi. Thanks to

CURE, Mussa is now able to walk normally and attend school. He also carries the distinction of being the very first child healed through our CUREkids initiative!

Junior Honduras

Junior's future looked hopeless. Born with bilateral clubfoot, he was abandoned by his parents and left to live with his elderly grandmother, Maria. She had little means to support them and no way of getting Junior the medical care he needed. Junior only went to school for a short time where he endured taunting and name calling from the other boys because of his condition.

Finally at age 12, Junior was referred to CURE's Honduras hospital. When he arrived at CURE, he was overwhelmed with the love and care he received. The spiritual staff explained to him that Jesus loves him and even though he has been living in a difficult situation, God has always been with him.

Today, Junior's future looks very different. With his two straight feet, he is back in school and looking forward to the day when he can get a job and find a better house for him and his grandmother. Best of all, both Junior and his grandmother have found faith in Jesus Christ – giving them hope not just for today, but for eternity.
